## The Role of Community and Collaboration for Young Farmers

- Community is a cornerstone for young farmers: fostering collaboration, providing mutual support, and enabling resource sharing.
- There is a dual perspective on communities: those *created* by farmers (e.g., producer organisations) and those *created* for farmers (e.g., youth organisations).
- There are increasing challenges like high land costs (e.g., Ireland) and limited accessibility for young farmers.



## Key outcomes of the discussion

- > Rural youth organisations: smaller, focused groups foster stronger commitment. Examples: Austria and the Netherlands successfully use platforms for regular interactions.
- > Producer organisations: while effective in some areas (e.g., Austria's cooperative buying groups), challenges persist, such as communication quality and platform management.
- > Leadership: local trust is crucial. Leaders should be from the community but supported by communication professionals.





## Community as a driver for change

- Mentimeter results highlighted that communities are key to collaboration, innovation, and shaping public policies.
- Participants saw potential for communities to advocate for improved public services in rural areas.
- Strong, well-managed communities can help align agricultural policies with young farmers' needs.
