On-farm demonstrations for peer-to-peer learning and innovation'

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The EU CAP Network seminar 'On-farm demonstrations for peer-to-peer learning and innovation' brought together 179 participants from 24 EU Member States, Montenegro and North Macedonia – including farmers, researchers, advisors, and policy makers – to explore how on-farm demonstrations can enhance peerto-peer learning and drive innovation uptake in agriculture. Held over 1.5 days, the event focused on unlocking the potential of on-farm demonstrations by improving their visibility, organisation, and structural support.

What we learned

The seminar opened with an overview of EU support for on-farm demonstrations and an introduction to the seminar's key concepts. This laid the groundwork for discussions centred on two main areas:

- 1. **Improving organisation and facilitation during demonstration events** participants exchanged tips making demonstrations more engaging through simple, practical ways of showcasing sustainable farming practices, actively facilitating group discussions, and including sensory experiences.
- Fostering stronger support systems a "knowledge expedition" highlighted the wide array of public and private support mechanisms for on-farm demonstrations across the EU. Participants discussed their strengths, challenges and opportunities for improvement. The cases demonstrated that more can be done to better integrate on-farm demonstrations in national and regional agricultural knowledge and innovation systems (AKIS).

A '**wall of learning**' captured inspiring ideas throughout the event on how to enhance demonstration events.

Field visits in the Veneto region: seeing is believing

Participants visited four demonstration farms in the Veneto region, which showcased the diverse roles these farms play – from sharing knowledge and innovations among farmers, to promoting sustainable farming to the public.

Moving forward

In the final session of the seminar, participants worked in professional groups to discuss how they can help unlock the full potential of on-farm demonstrations. The seminar highlighted the significant potential of on-farm demonstrations to support peer-to-peer learning, spread knowledge, build connections, and support innovation, including results from EIP-AGRI Operational Groups (OGs) and Horizon projects. Participants agreed that this tool deserves greater visibility and use in the future.
